When he comes home, his children love to hear about his moonlit adventures and when he has to go away again, they relive his tales of earlier adventures, make a moon machine out of an old table, and dream of being joined with him through the all-seeing moon.

All Aboard the London Bus - Patty Toht

Come! Board the London Bus and see the London sights with us. At any time, hop off, explore! Then climb back on, and ride some more... As a family of four spend a day exploring London, fun, child-friendly poems introduce readers to our wonderful capital city, and all its secrets. Well-known landmarks like Buckingham Palace, Big Ben and the London Eye, plus inescapable features like rain and taking tea, all get Patty Toht's witty treatment. Non-fiction facts provide more information about the subjects, while rising star Sam Usher brings them to life with his signature style and humour.

Amazing Grace - Mary Hoffman

Grace loves to act out stories. Sometimes she plays the leading part, sometimes she is 'a cast of thousands.' When her school decides to perform Peter Pan, Grace is longing to play Peter, but her classmates say that Peter was a boy, and besides, he wasn't black...But Grace's Ma and Nana tell her she can be anything she wants if she puts her mind to it. Look out for the other wonderful books about Grace and her family.

Anna Hibiscus - Atinuke

At the very end of the book, the little girl of the story has become an old woman and now she gives the secret to her great granddaughter and watches the tiger take the little girl on her first dance.

The Day the Crayons Quit - Drew Daywalt and Oliver Jeffers

A brilliant best-selling book from an award- winning pair. A story of compassion, and love, and a simple belief in the healing powers of nature. This is a powerful folktale about a lonely giant who lives by a beautiful lake. When he saves a girl from drowning, the giant finds the love and courage to save the lake from destruction.

Gorilla - Anthony Browne

This prize-winning book by the former Children's Laureate tells the endearing story of a lonely little girl. Hannah loves gorillas but has never seen one. Her father, who looks after her by himself, is too busy to take her to the zoo - or for anything else come to that. For her birthday, Hannah asks her father for a gorilla - but is disappointed when she discovers that the gorilla she's been given is just a toy. Each fascinating story introduces Katie to a new artist or group of artists, including Leonardo da Vinci and the Impressionists, or to a place, for example London or Scotland. They are all unmissable!

Kevin - Rob Biddulph

If you enjoy this, Lollipop's adventures continue in *Clever Lollipop*.

The Lemur's Tale - Ophelia Redpath

This is the beautifully written and illustrated story of a baby ring-tailed lemur who escapes from captivity on board a ship and finds a warm refuge hiding away in the home of an eccentric family. His night-time antics cause confusion, as he nibbles on the family's plants and raids their larder, and unfortunately the daughter of the family gets the blame. But the truth comes out at last when the family discover him curled up in a teapot and the lemur finds a loving home and a lonely little girl finds happiness with her new friend.

Leon and the Place Between - Angela Mcallister and Grahame Baker-Smith

Highly commended for the Kate Greenaway Medal for the stunning combination of text and illustration. Wanting to prove to his brothers and sister that magic really exists, Leon volunteers to be in Abdul Kazam's magic show and gets transported to a mysterious world. Filled with rabbits, doves, playing cards and magician's assistants - among other things - if a magician can make it disappear, it will end up in the Place Between! When Leon returns, not only do his brothers and sister believe, but we do too. With diecut holes into and out of the 'Place Between', the reader takes a journey right through the pages of the book, into the mysterious world of Grahame Baker-Smith's breath-taking illustrations.

What happens next is an action-packed, farcical romp that weaves all the different plots together, and ends in a thrilling car chase with Mr Gaskitt saving the day! If you like this book, read more about this amazing family in the other books in the series - The Woman Who Won Things, The Cat Who Got Carried Away and The Children Who Smelled a Rat.

Meerkat Mail - Emily Gravett

A brilliant picture book from a prize-winning author. Sunny the meerkat lives with his enormous family in the Kalahari desert. They are all very close ...so close, in fact, that one day Sunny decides he's had enough and packs his bags. He's off to visit his mongoose cousins. But from the watery world of the Marsh Mongoose to the nocturnal lifestyle of the Malagasy Mongoose, Sunny just doesn't fit in. And who's that shadowy figure who seems to be following him around? There's so much to enjoy, from the newspaper cuttings on the endpapers to the wittily accurate information about each mongoose species Sunny visits on his journey.

Michael - Tony Bradman and Tony Ross

Michael is...different. At school, Michael's teachers despair of him. He is late, scruffy, cheeky and doesn't listen. He loves reading and sums and science. But NOT the kind that happens in school. While the teachers wag their fingers, Michael gets set for the adventure of his life. Have those teachers have misjudged him? Is there no hope for him at all? Or is it good to be different?

Miranda the Explorer - James Mayhew

Gorgeously illustrated, this is a magical way to learn about some of the world's great landmarks. A competition to win a ride in a hot air balloon becomes an exciting adventure when the rope holding the balloon snaps and Miranda sails away. All alone and with only a map to aid her, Miranda takes an unexpected trip around the world. With a little bit of help from people she meets along the way, Miranda soon discovers how to fly the balloon but will she find her way home again?

The Most Wonderful Thing in the World - Vivian French and Angela Barrett

Vivian French's masterful retelling of a forgotten story is both funny and heart-warming, and Angela Barrett's breathtaking illustrations give life to an enchanting and romantic fairytale city. When a king and a queen promise to marry their daughter Lucia to the man who can show them the most wonderful thing in the world, suitors descend on the palace bearing gifts. Roses, jewels and exotic birds; dancing girls, wind machines and mythical beasts - but nothing feels quite right. As the last suitor leaves, his weapons of mass destruction rejected, the king and queen are exhausted. But when a shy, young man, who isn't a suitor at all, steps forward, they finally understand what the most wonderful thing in the world really is.

The Mousehole Cat - Antonia Barber

Their life is a happy one - until one terrible winter the Great Storm-Cat comes clawing and snarling and leaping at the harbour walls, so that no boat can go out to sea to fish. Soon, with Christmas coming, there is no food left in Mousehole. It is then that Mowzer and Tom set out to brave the fury of the waves together, and discover that it might just need a cat's perspective to understand - and tame - the ferocious ways of the Great Storm-Cat sea... Gently yet powerfully told, this is an incredibly moving story of bravery, sacrifice and companionship inspired by Cornish legend.

Mr Wolf Bounces Back - Tony Bradman

This hilarious and easy to read book is part of a series of stories about what happens after the fairy tale ends. In this book, we find out what the big bad wolf does when he has had enough of being mean and scary. He takes himself down to the job centre where he finds the perfect role as a security guard to the three little pigs! Look out for the other great books in this series too - including *Red Riding Takes Charge*, *Rapunzel Cuts Loose* and *Goldilocks and the Just Right Club*.

Mungo and the Picture Book Pirates - Timothy Knapman and Adam Stower

A 'bookish' adventure written by best-selling author, Timothy Knapman. with bold cartoon style illustrations by Adam Stower. Each night Mungo reads his favourite story, a swashbuckling tale of danger, kidnap and rescue. But one night the hero, Captain Fleet, isn't there to save the day so Mungo decides to step in. He takes a deep breath and bravely jumps into the story and his very own pirate adventure. If you enjoy this, don't miss the companion books, *Mungo and the Dinosaur Island* and *Mungo and the Spiders from Space*.

My Naughty Little Puppy 1: A Home for Rascal - Holly Webb

Keen readers who love animals will really enjoy this first book in a best-selling series by the hugely popular author, Holly Webb. Ellie's family have just adopted a beautiful Jack Russell puppy, who Ellie names Rascal, although when she chooses the name, she doesn't realize how right she is! Rascal is really naughty, and he's soon getting himself and Ellie into all sorts of trouble. Will she ever be able to keep up with him? If you like this, there are several other books in the series to enjoy.

The Orchard Book of Aesop's Fables - Michael Morpurgo

A collection of over twenty of Aesop's best-loved fables, including favourites such as *The Hare and the Tortoise*, *Town Mouse and Country Mouse*, *Dog in the Manger and The Lion and the Mouse*. The tales are retold with warmth and humour by former Children's Laureate Michael Morpurgo and brought to life by Emma Chichester Clark's amazing illustrations.

The Other Ark - Lynley Dodd

A fabulously fun new twist on Noah's Ark by prize-winning author, Lynley Dodd! The rain is fast approaching and Noah's ark is full, but there are still lots of animals queueing to get on board. So Noah has to ask his friend, Sam Jam Balu, to take the mad kangaroosters, flying flapdoodles and Mongolian sneeth in the 'second-best' boat. But is the super confident Sam up to the task? Something is bound to go wrong - and it does! If you like this and you haven't already discovered them, you should also look out for Lynley Dodd's brilliant and funny Hairy Maclary and Slinki Malinki books

The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark - Jill Tomlinson

How can Plop, the baby owl who is afraid of the dark, overcome his problems? Luckily, everyone has a story to tell him about the very special things that happen after dark and soon Plop is as happy in the dark as any other baby owl. If you enjoy this book, look out for some of Jill Tomlinson's other gentle and reassuring animal stories. There are two versions of this story, both illustrated by Paul Howard - the full story is told in a chapter book with simple line drawing illustrations but there is also an abridged full colour picture book edition.

The Night Gardener - Terry and Eric Fan

This is a beautiful book which invites us to see the beauty of the world around us, and celebrates the power of art to bring us together and enrich lives. Grimloch Lane is a quiet place and its residents hurry up and down in silence. One day, William discovers that the tree outside his window has been sculpted into a wise owl. In the following days, more topiaries appear, and each one is more beautiful than the last. Soon, William's grey little town is full of colour and life. And though the mysterious night gardener disappears as suddenly as he appeared, William and his town are changed forever.

The Paper Bag Princess - Robert Munsch

The Paper Bag Princess has been called one of the best children's books ever written and has been a best-seller for nearly 40 years. It is the story of a resourceful princess and her useless prince, reverses the princess and dragon folklore stereotype and celebrates feisty females everywhere.

The Pet Person - Jeanne Willis & Tony Ross

This favourite tale from prize-winning picture book creators Jeanne Willis and Tony Ross, takes a typically sideways and comic look at family life and pet ownership. Little Rex the dog is desperate to get a pet person for his birthday, but his parents and relations are dead against it: 'it'll ruin the furniture' says mum, draped on an elegant chaise longue; 'they are impossible to train' barks Auntie Sheba, resplendent in tweed suit and feathered trilby. Indeed, when Rex finds a little ginger person in the park, he quickly realises there's a lot of truth in the grown-ups' warnings! If you enjoy this, look out for some of the other Jeanne Willis/Tony Ross collaborations.

Pirate School: Just a Bit of Wind - Jeremy Strong

This is the first in a hilarious series of brightly illustrated chapter books by best-selling comic author, Jeremy Strong. It's the first day at Pirate School for Ziggy, Smudge, Carkella and Flo and they have lots of new things to contend with. Their headteacher is the scary Patagonia Clasterbotton and they have to take lessons include walking the plank and hand-to-hand fighting. When out on the pirate ship a storm blows up, resulting in the children having to rescue Patagonia when she's swept overboard, and they learn that really Patagonia is not so scary after all! If you like this, you will also enjoy the other Pirate School books.

The Princess and the Pea - Lauren Child and Polly Borland

There are of course lots of retellings of Hans Christian Andersen's story but this is one of the best the tale of a prince, a princess, perfect politeness, pages of love and a peculiarly hard pea. This utterly original interpretation of the classic tale has dazzling illustrations from multi-talented collaborators, award-winning Lauren Child and widely acclaimed photographer Polly Borland. For a different take on the story, try *The Pea and the Princess* by Mini Grey, which tells it from the point of view of the Pea and is very funny!

Princess Smartypants - Babette Cole

In this riotously funny picture book, Princess Smartypants does not want to get married. She enjoys being a Ms. But being a rich and pretty princess means that all the princes want her to be their Mrs. Find out how Princess Smartypants fights to preserve her independence in this fairy-tale-with-a-difference. If you like this, don't miss Babette Cole's other books about this feisty princess or the equally entertaining tale of *Prince Cinders*.

Sir Charlie Stinky Socks and the Really Big Adventure - Kristina Stephenson

The best-selling children's picture book about one brave knight and a whole lot of adventure. Once upon a time, there was a deep, dark forest, where monstrous trees groaned, terrible beasties moaned and wiggly woos waited to tickle your toes. Nobody ever went there until... Sir Charlie Stinkysocks, his good grey mare and his pet cat Envelope decide the time has come for a really big adventure. Sir Charlie packs his best sword and his sandwiches and off he goes, over the hills and far away, until he gets to the deep, dark forest. There's a Tiger in the Garden - Lizzy Stewart

Grandma's back garden turns into a jungle full of adventure in this striking, prize-winning picture book. When Grandma says she's seen a tiger in the garden, Nora doesn't believe her. She's too old to play Grandma's silly games! Everyone knows that tigers live in jungles, not gardens. So even when Nora sees butterflies with wings as big as her arm, and plants that try and eat her toy giraffe, and a polar bear that likes fishing, she knows there's absolutely, DEFINITELY no way there could be a tiger in the garden ...Could there?

Tidy - Emily Gravett

Emily Gravett, author/illustrator of many best-selling books, offers us this very funny rhyming woodland story about the perils of being too tidy. Pete the badger likes everything to be neat and tidy at all times, but what starts as the collecting of one fallen leaf escalates quickly and ends with the complete destruction of the forest! Will Pete realise the error of his ways and set things right? Lush foliage and delightfully funny characters abound in this dramatic tale of overzealous neatness that delivers its message of environmental preservation with subtlety and humour.

The Tin Forest - Helen Ward and Wayne Anderson

There was once a wide wind-swept place, near to nowhere and close to forgotten...So begins this story that shows how, with a little love, even the most barren landscape can be a home to all sorts of life. Exquisite and fascinating illustrations beautifully capture the hopeful mood of this story about the power of dreaming. Living in a miserable grey world, an old man repeatedly dreams of colour and growth. Gradually his world begins to full up with colour, change and therefore hope. Helen Ward, better known as one of our finest illustrators, has produced a poetic text, while Wayne Anderson has brought this fantastical world to life in his inimitable style.

Willy and Hugh - Anthony Browne

This is just one of the former Children's Laureate wonderful, funny and thought-provoking books about Willy the Chimp. In this story, lonely Willy meets and becomes friends with Hugh Jape. They are very different but together they make a great team and are able to help each other out. If you like this book, look out for some of the others in the series - including Willy the Champ, Willy the Wimp and Willy the Wizard.
